





Inclusive gardening project announced at Newton Community Hospital in St Helens

- Patients, visitors and NHS staff to benefit from improved garden space at hospital, with innovative project to be led by social care charity Community Integrated Care



An inclusive gardening project will take place at Newton Community Hospital in St Helens throughout the rest of the year, allowing people with learning disabilities, autism, and mental health concerns to learn and develop new gardening skills, helping to deliver a new and improved garden space for hospital patients, visitors and NHS staff to enjoy.

The innovative project is being led by national social care charity Community Integrated Care, and is being funded by healthcare investor Renova and with additional support and investment from Community Health Partnerships (CHP), a key part of the NHS family. Support for the gardening project is also being provided by St Helens and Knowsley NHS Trust who provide inpatient ward services at Newton Community Hospital.

The project builds on a <u>successful initiative last year</u> that saw Community Integrated Care and the people it supports create an accessible garden space at the hospital – detailed analysis of last year's activities showed that for every £1 invested, over £13 in social value was created. To continue this work, the new inclusive gardening project is now underway and will run for a full year, including:

Creating unique opportunities for people who have care and support needs

- The project will give people who access care and support an exciting platform to form friendships, achieve personal successes and develop horticultural skills.
- Community Integrated Care will re-engage volunteers from last year's initiative as well as engaging new volunteers, creating opportunities for personal and social development and a potential pathway to paid work or volunteering.
- An online learning component will also be introduced for those in care that are unable to access the opportunity inperson – through online learning, even more people will be able to gain new skills, improve their personal development and develop their gardens at home

Delivering a welcoming garden space for hospital patients, visitors and NHS staff to enjoy

- The accessible garden space delivered last summer will be further maintained and improved, with a professional gardener now appointed to help oversee the space, and the training of volunteers involved
- Gardening work the volunteers will carry out over the summer months will include herb basket making, planting and cutting of flower beds, potato growing, wildflower meadow creation, and willow and hazel fence making

Bringing the excitement of the Rugby League World Cup to the hospital

- Community Integrated Care is the Official Social Care Partner of the Rugby League World Cup (RLWC) tournament that will take place in the Autumn, so the RWLC will continue to be a key theme of the planting work taking place at Newton Community Hospital, including RWLC themed planters
- There are also plans for a celebration event later this year, with RLWC representatives and players meeting with volunteers and staff and key partners from the garden project

<u>Community Integrated Care</u> is one of the UK's biggest and most successful social care charities, supporting more than 4000 people who have learning disabilities, autism, mental health concerns and acquired brain injuries. Renova, owned by healthcare investor Fulcrum, has helped to deliver 17 community healthcare facilities across the North West, serving the Merseyside and Cheshire boroughs of St Helens, Knowsley, Halton & Warrington.

CHP are the head tenant at Newton Community Hospital, responsible for providing facilities management for various NHS services including a 30-bed inpatient ward. These patients are often older people moving from hospital, via intermediate care at Newton Community Hospital, then returning to their homes.

"We are delighted to continue our support of the garden project at Newton Community Hospital in partnership with Renova and Community Integrated Care. We understand that gardening and horticultural therapy reduces anxiety and improves overall well-being whilst also helping to combat loneliness and social isolation.
